## Worksheet: Suggested Framework for Visualizing Progress Through the Program

Note: These worksheets outline a suggested sequence of courses. While it is possible to take four courses in a semester without going over credit limits, these timelines show that taking three courses per semester is sufficient for making "ideal" progress.
