
Graduate Students

On March 28, graduate students from our very own sociology department will present at the Graduate Student Colloquium. The presentations will begin at 3pm in Crosley 1606. Presenters include Megan Underhill, Ainsley Lambert, Michael Black and Katie Durante, and Mike on 19 draws

Megan Underhill will be presenting a research proposal to explore how middle class, white Americans racially socialize their children. While some research has been done on the process by which the racial identity of black, Asian, and multi-racial Americans develops over the life course, literature has largely ignored white Americans. Megan recognizes the need to address this gap in the literature, which unintentionally perpetuates the myth that only "non-whites have race."

Our second presenter, Ainsley Lambert, will discuss her thesis research which is based on 19 interviews, and draws on social and cultural capital theories to examine the complex process in which both family and school factors influence students' college enrollment decisions.

Michael Black and Katie Durante will be discussing their workin-progress, which examines the relationship between labor surplus and punishment. Using the National Prisoner Statistics and sup-



variables.

Our final panelist, Mike Rosino, will be presenting his research which examines online communities to discover how group knowledge and shared meanings are developed through asynchronous computer mediated communication. He finds that positive responses to online posts which are deemed high quality, explanatory, or credible validate the knowledge and interpretations contained within them

Gara Krieder will be presenting part of her thesis titled "Gender Influences on the Risk Factors of Obesity" on Wednesday, April 9th in TUC 423 at 11:30am. The purpose of her work is to examine how gender differences influence obesity rates after life

course events. Using body mass index rates to determine obesity, this work examines how marriage, employment, and children might influence changes in these rates and vary by gender. Gara will also be presenting variations of this paper at NCSA in Cincinnati and SSSP in San Francisco.
