FROM THE HEAD

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected us all. It has been more than eight months since I have seen WGSS faculty, staff, and students in person. In spring 2020 and 2021, we held the WGSS graduation and awards ceremony virtually to safeguard the health of students, staff, faculty, and community members. Although we would love to share the same space with students, we understand that it's important right now to teach remotely and to observe social-distancing guidelines. I am grateful to work with the WGSS leadership team during this time: Professor Carolyn Peterson is WGSS Undergraduate Program Director, Dr. Michelle McGowan is Graduate Program Director, and Dr. Carolette Norwood is WGSS Assistant Head.

In the midst of the pandemic, I am happy to share some good news. UC approved a new LGBTQ Studies undergraduate certificate over the summer of 2020! Professors Carolyn Peterson and Beth Ash and I collaborated on the certificate's creation. This new program honors the forward-thinking scholarship of UC WGSS Professors Emeritae, Drs. Michelle Gibson and Deb Meem, in LGBTQ Studies. With former UC faculty member, Dr. Jonathan Alexander, they are the authors of the first LGBTQ Studies textbook, Finding Out: Introduction to LGBT Studies, which is in its third edition! Professors Gibson and Meem also organized around LGBTQ rights on UC's campus. We are so very happy that this program has attracted 37 certificate students in the first year of its existence. In addition, WGSS faculty members like Dr. Olga Sanmiguel-Valderrama, Associate Professor, have incorporated the pandemic into their research program. Dr. Sanmiguel-Valderrama is studying how the COVID-19 pandemic has affected Latinx agricultural workers' labor practices and organizing in Colombia, Canada, and the United States.

In February 2021, WGSS hosted Dr. Zakiya T. Luna, Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of California, Santa Barbara, as our Taft Distinguished Lecturer. She is the author of Reproductive Rights as Human Rights: Women of Color and the Fight for Reproductive Justice (New York UP, 2020) and coeditor of Black Feminist Sociology: Perspectives and Praxis (Routledge, forthcoming). Her lecture addressed US reproductive justice organizing and Black feminist theorizing.

I am happy to share some wonderful news from our WGSS faculty and students.

- In 2021, Signs: Journal of Women in Culture and Society, perhaps the most prestigious in WGSS, published an essay by Dr. Carolette Norwood titled "Misrepresenting Reproductive Justice: A Black Feminist Critique of 'Protecting Black Life." Congratulations on this accomplishment, Dr. Norwood!
- Earlier in the year, The New England Journal of Medicine published an essay titled "Care Churn—Why Keeping Clinic Doors Open Isn't Enough to Ensure Access to Abortion" by Dr. Michelle McGowan, along with Dr. Alison Norris and Dr. Danielle Bessett, a WGSS affiliate faculty member. This important essay addresses factors that affect the delivery and availability of abortion services in the United States. Congratulations on this significant achievement, Dr. McGowan!
- Several WGSS MA students received fellowship and grant awards to support their research: Rory Barron and Kelsey Mello received UC University Research Council Graduate Student Stipend awards; Silver Flight, Morgan Gimblet, Kelsey Mello, and Melanie Nipper received Taft Graduate Summer Fellowships; Stevie Leigh and Erin Winchester received Taft Graduate Enrichment Awards; Silver Flight also received a WGSS Public Internship Award to work with Equality Ohio; and Morgan Mitchell received a Farmworker Justice Fellowship, Northwest Justice Project. Congratulations to all!

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Background to Friends of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGSS) Board

In 1980, Mary Ellen Heintz and some of her feminist activists established the Friends of WGSS to support the activities and growth of the Department of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (known at the time as the Department of Women's Studies) at the University of Cincinnati. Upon Mary Ellen Heintz's death in 2001, with the help of Friends' fund-raising and a generous donation from her estate, a departmental endowed chair was established in her name, currently held by Professor Amy Lind.

During the decades following, Friends provided a full stipend for one Graduate Assistantship (with the generous donation in the last five years from Professor Emerita Deb Meem and Professor Emerita Michelle Gibson). The Board also raised money for the Women's Library Fund to purchase books and journals related to gender and sexuality. Before the restrictions of this year, Friends hosted seminars, films, and other forums to discuss important gender issues in an outreach program to the broader community.

The Friends Board is comprised of a diverse cross-section of scholars, activists, and nonprofit professionals from across the Greater Cincinnati region. It is a vast social network that serves as an informal mentoring association for graduate students. The engagement between the Friends Board and the students amplifies the sense of community connectedness that often has impact on students' likelihood of successfully completing their degree program. In the last several years, a connection of a new WGSS graduate student to a specific member of the board has helped to establish a closer relationship with one member of the Friends Board. The annual Friends Welcome Dinner is another important opportunity for the Board, WGSS faculty, and students to socialize, connect, and collaborate.

"There are two main things I'm looking forward towards next semester. First, I'm excited to meet the students who enroll in the course. Secondly, Queer of Color Critique (QoCC) is a subject area that is really dear to me. "I am looking forward to exploring the connections between gueer diaspora, sexuality, kinship, and cultural production this semester. We will be delving into multiple geographic contexts and we'll be focusing on selected case studies in this course. I am thrilled to journey with students and collectively examine the work of scholars, artists, and activists to gain a deeper understanding of the gueer diaspora. I am sure exploring what it means to 'queer' migration and in which ways migration can be read as gueer will lead to generative discussions. Reading the work of scholars such as Karma R.
